CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS

In order to further support social distancing and limitations on public gatherings, Governor Inslee issued [Proclamation 20-28](#) to temporarily address requirements of the state's Open Public Meetings Act (OPMA) that require a physical location for the public to observe government meetings. This proclamation continues to be extended during the pandemic, and as a result City Council meetings are required to be held over the telephone or internet and the public must be able to hear the meeting live via telephone.

The City Council's next regular meeting is on **Monday, May 3** beginning at 7:00 p.m. via telephone and internet ([Meeting ID: 831 0354 6790 | Passcode: 050321](#)). The agenda includes: (1) Recognition of Legislators (Tentative); (2) Sound Transit Update; (3) Approval of Interlocal Agreement with Snohomish County for Bicentennial Park Playground Grant; (4) Adoption of Amendment to Salary Ordinance (Tentative); and (5) Update on COVID-19.

The City Council's next work/study session is on **Thursday, May 13** beginning at 7:00 p.m. via telephone and internet ([Meeting ID: 861 4327 1135 | Passcode: 051321](#)). COMMUNITY MEETINGS AND EVENTS

- **Restaurant Revitalization Fund (RRF):** The American Rescue Plan Act established the Restaurant Revitalization Fund to provide funding to help restaurants and other eligible businesses keep their doors open. This program will provide restaurants with funding equal to their pandemic-related revenue loss up to \$10 million per business and no more than \$5 million per physical location. Recipients are not required to repay the funding as long as funds are used for eligible uses no later than March 11, 2023. **Registration for the [SBA application portal](#) opened on Friday, April 30, 2021 and applications will open on Monday, May 3, 2021, at noon ET.**

SBA held a Restaurant Revitalization Fund Information Session on Friday, April 30 and the city shared this information on its social media sites and contacted previous businesses who received assistance in 2020 to let them know.

CITY CLERK AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS

- **Step Up: Moving Racial Equity Forward Conference:** On Friday, April 30, members of the City Council and Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Commission, along with city staff, attended the #StepUp2021 virtual all-day conference.

This program was designed for participants to gain deeper understanding and new perspectives about racial equity and social justice. The conference provides innovative tools on how to address systemic racism in respective organizations and institutions that are applicable across sectors. The conference offered a variety of workshops for people with diverse interests and different levels of knowledge and experiences. The workshop sessions covered a variety of topics including how to address institutional racism, white supremacy cultural norms, and microaggressions. Attendees also explored decolonization of education, the intersection of race and LGBTQIA+ people, systems change, and more.

- **Guest Speaker at DEIC Meeting:** The Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Commission held a meeting on April 28 that included guest speaker Shaykh Umair Ahmed, who spoke with the Commission about the local Muslim community as well as Ramadan, the most sacred month of the year in Islamic culture and Eid-al-Fitr (Festival of the Breaking of the Fast), a three-day long celebration following Ramadan.
- **Earth Day Volunteer Park Clean Up:** About 28 volunteers attended a work party at Ballinger Park on Saturday, April 24, in honor of Earth Day and Arbor Day.

Despite a rainy morning, these dedicated volunteers came prepared with rain attire, boots, gloves, and face coverings. Thanks to the Ballinger Organic Garden (MLTBOG) for participating and handing out seeds!



- **Mountlake Terrace Recruiting for Boards and Commissions:** The city is seeking applicants to serve on its boards and commissions. The city recruits annually to have applications on file as periodic openings occur, and currently there are interim openings on the Arts Advisory Commission and the Recreation & Parks Advisory Commission. Most city boards and commissions have three-year terms that expire on June 30, with the exception of the Planning Commission, which has terms of four years.

The city has four regular boards and commissions: Arts Advisory Commission; Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Commission; Planning Commission; and Recreation and Parks Advisory Commission. Additionally, the city has two commissions that meet less frequently including the Civil Service Commission (meets as needed – typically 1-3 times per year) and the City Council Salary Commission (meets every three years).

In most cases, board and commission members do not need specialized training or experience. Members find volunteering fun and rewarding by meeting people with similar interests, learning about the city, and helping shape the future of Mountlake Terrace. We seek volunteers who represent the diverse community, and welcome all applicants.

- **Virtual Blood Drive:** This week, the city met with Bloodworks Northwest about future blood drive opportunities including a Virtual Blood Drive in the month of June and perhaps collaborating with South County Fire and other partners for a Pop-Up site event as well. An article will be included in the June city newsletter as well as social media announcements and a news release. Stay tuned for more information.
- **Summer Events:** The city is working with the sponsors of this summer's events including the 3rd of July fireworks and Tour de Terrace to discuss whether or not these events can move forward with modifications and extra staffing required to meet COVID-19 requirements issued by the state. The Governor's office recently issued COVID-19 requirements for fairs and special events allowed under Phase 3, however, Snohomish Health District announced that current trends indicate Snohomish County is in danger of reverting to Phase 2, which would essentially cancel these special events.
- **COVID-19 Vaccine:** The Washington State Department of Health launched a [web tool](#) to help you find a vaccination appointment by entering your zip code. The tool looks at various scheduling options from multiple providers to find a vaccination appointment easier and is available in multiple languages (see upper right corner to change to another language besides English). - **Evictions Moratorium and Ban on Utility Shutoffs Extended:** In March, the Governor issued a [Proclamation](#) extending Washington State's moratorium on evictions through June 30, 2021. The moratorium is intended to protect tenants who have fallen behind on their rent because of the economic downturn that arrived with the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, the Governor [extended provisions](#) to ban shutting off utility services to those behind on their payments through July 31, 2021.

- **COVID-19 Case Rates:** Each week, Snohomish County's COVID-19 case counts graphic is updated and posted on the [city's website](#). According to Snohomish Health District and other public health agencies, the case counts are rising again and although people are getting vaccinated, it is still very important to continue to wear masks, avoid large gatherings, physically distance, and wash your hands until the virus is under control.

- **Zoom Council Meetings:** The recorded videos of City Council meetings on Zoom are available on the bottom of the City Council's [meeting page](#).

- **Public Access to City Facilities:** During Governor Inslee's Coronavirus orders, Interim City Hall, the Police Station and the Public Works Shop are closed to the public. The city will continue to process building and development permits, inspect essential construction activities, provide police services and maintain grounds and infrastructure.

The Recreation Pavilion hours are Monday through Thursday, 5:45 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. and Friday 5:45 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. with reservations necessary for all programs. The facility is not open on the weekend. Please email mltrecreation@mltwa.gov or call 425-776-9173 Monday-Friday to register or get more information about our programs.

Athletic fields opened March 1 by reservation only and with appropriate safety plans. Park trails, the boat launch, fishing pier, off-leash dog park, tennis courts and basketball court are open, subject to gathering and social distancing requirements. PUBLIC WORKS/ENGINEERING SERVICES

- **Natural Yard Care Webinar:** The city sponsored a [natural yard care webinar](#) provided by Snohomish Conservation District. The webinar covered ways to reduce impacts to the environment from yard care, provided gardening ideas for this spring and summer, and ideas for how to make your yard beautiful without resorting to chemicals or increasing your water bill. Unique, beautiful landscaping can be low maintenance and can reduce stormwater runoff, keeping lakes and streams clean. - **Application Process:** Until further notice, City Hall will remain closed to the public. All [permit applications](#) are accepted at this time through a ‘no-contact’ procedure. Note: Permit processing times have increased to 4-6 weeks due to compliance with COVID-19 mandates. Call 425-775-9694 to schedule an inspection and have your permit number and address ready. Your project must have issued permits on-site, require workers to be six-feet apart, and have a developed exposure control, mitigation, and recovery plan (Washington State Department of Labor & Industries will enforce requirements for contractors to comply). *The permit intake box is located by the door to City Hall on the second floor. A permit specialist will be in contact with confirmation of receipt and invoice fees due to begin processing.

FINANCE

- **Utility Billing Bill Processing, Online Account Management and Payment Services:** The Request for Proposals (RFP) for a Vendor/Contractor that can provide the city with utility bill printing/ mailing, payment processing/lock box services, and online bill pay, plus email, text and phone call notifications and payment processing ended on April 30. - **City Utility Billing Payment Update:** In response to a cyberattack on a vendor the city uses to process utility payments (AFTS), the city is using a different online payment option that is now live on the city's website. A link to the CardPoint payment service option is [available](#). Customers will need their account information available as this new vendor is merely an online payment portal and does not have your utility account information to view.

There are three ways to pay: (1) Mail to PO Box 72, Mountlake Terrace, WA 98043; (2) Use the payment drop box outside of Interim City Hall at 6100 219th Street SW; or (3) Utilize the [online payment option](#) the city has secured with our vendor CardConnect. **If you already use bill pay with your bank, please confirm the mailing address is PO Box 72, Mountlake Terrace, WA 98043.**

Utility bills look a little different because the city is processing them in-house instead of through the vendor (see sample bill). We ask you to mail checks to the city, rather than AFTS (which has a Seattle address). These changes are temporary until all services are restored. - **Relief Due to COVID-19 Emergency:** Since March 19, 2020, water service is not being shut off for residential customers' inability to pay during the COVID-19 emergency. The action remains in effect under the state's most recent proclamations addressing the pandemic. No late fees or penalties will apply during this time.

The service fee charged by the vendor for online utility payments has also been suspended for those choosing to pay online. The city recognizes that COVID-19 is a threat to the health of the community, and the ability to frequently wash our hands is paramount in the fight to curb the spread of the virus. As called for by the state and Snohomish Health District, this step will enable the community to ensure proper cleaning measures. We encourage customers to continue to make their payments or to contact Utility Billing at utilitybilling@mltwa.gov or 425-744-6214 or to make payment arrangements, if they are unable to pay at this time.

RECREATION, PARKS & PROPERTY MANAGEMENT

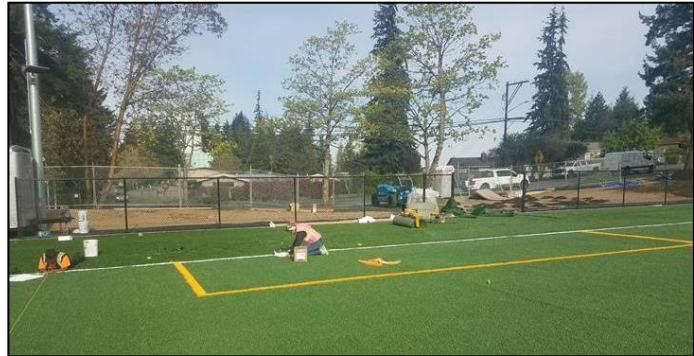
- **Swimming Lessons:** Registration is [available online](#) for the second session of swimming lessons. The second session will run every two weeks on Mondays/Wednesdays from April 26 to May 6 or Tuesdays/Thursdays from April 27 to May 7. We are offering beginning levels 1-3 in both preschool and school age. The second session includes a morning session of parent/tot for children ages six months to three years old and their parent.
- **Lifeguard Training Class:** A Lifeguard Training Course will be offered through the American Red Cross, using the blended learning format that includes an online lecture and the water skills portion at the Recreation Pavilion on May 8, 15 and 22 from 10:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m., fees are \$186 for residents and \$205 for non-residents. The class will follow current COVID-19 guidelines set up by the American Red Cross and Department of Health, with PPE, rescue manikins and social distancing during class times. Candidates must register in advance to allow enough time to complete the online portion, which is approximately seven hours and it must be done before the first in person session. Candidates must be able to

swim 300 yards non-stop, complete a timed event in one minute forty seconds and tread water for two minutes using only their legs. - **Hiring:** Aquatics is hiring part-time Lifeguards and Swim Instructors for summer and beyond. To be a Lifeguard, candidates must hold a current Lifeguarding Certification and enjoy working with all ages. - **Dog Obedience:** The first session of Dog Obedience class, in one year, is now finishing. - **Evergreen Playfield:** The Evergreen Playfield turf renovation project is coming close to completion. The contractor, Fieldturf, has been continuing construction of the new synthetic turf field to replace the existing sand field at the Evergreen Playfield Complex Field #1. Fieldturf is currently installing the synthetic turf and stitching all seams and bases into place. They will begin adding infill and completing fencing and backstops throughout the next week. Construction should be completed by the end of May.



POLICE DEPARTMENT

- **Police Lobby Closed for Construction:** The lobby remains closed for all in-person business due to construction of the Police Station expansion/Civic Campus Redevelopment Project. Impacted services include in-person payments, fingerprinting services, and license renewals.

Weekly Patrol Synopsis

- There were two verbal domestic arguments this week: 23600 block of 56th Avenue W and 21400 block of 52nd Avenue W.
- There were five vehicle prowls this week: 6600 block of 216th Street SW; 24300 block 56th Avenue W; 21500 block of 40th Avenue W; 21400 block of 48th Avenue W; and 23500 block of 56th Avenue W.

- There were seven warrant arrests this week: 5900 block of 232nd Street SW; 4000 block of 212th Street SW; 22600 block of 66th Avenue W; 4400 block of 212th Street SW; SB I-5 at the 22400 block; 5900 block of 232nd Street SW; and 22600 block of 73rd Place W.
- There were two vehicle thefts this week: 4100 block of 236th Street SW and 23300 block of Lakeview Drive.
- On April 21, officers were dispatched to the 24000 block of Van Ry Boulevard for a burglary in progress. Two subjects were contacted and confronted. Both subjects dropped what they had in their hands and fled. After an extensive K9 track, officers were unable to locate the suspects. It was later learned that the items the suspects dropped were two BB guns. The case is still under investigation.
- On April 21, a victim reported that he was scammed by someone he was communicating with on a dating website. The suspect posed as a police detective and demanded money to keep the victim from being in trouble for communicating with a minor.
- On April 21, an unknown person slashed a motorcycle tire at the 6300 block of St. Albion Way.
- On April 22, two windows were broken out of vehicles in the 24300 block of 56th Avenue W. There are no suspects or leads at this time.
- On April 22, a resident reported that he received a credit card acceptance letter, but he had not applied for any credit cards. The case is under investigation.
- On April 23, it was reported that a suspect stole prescription medicine from her father while in hospice care. The case is still under investigation.
- On April 25, a burglary was reported at the 4800 block of 236th Street SW. The case has been assigned to detectives.
- On April 26, officers responded to the 5400 block of 212th Street SW for a report of a physical domestic. Upon officers' arrival they noticed two fist-sized holes in a bedroom door. Just inside the door was an intoxicated male subject who denied any assault or damage to any property. A female who was also inside the home explained that she was assaulted by the male and showed officers her injuries. The male subject was arrested and booked into jail for domestic violence assault.
- On April 27, a burglary was reported at the 23000 block of Lakeview Drive. An unknown person broke into a garage and stole a generator. No suspects or leads at this time.

Significant Cases

- On April 21, patrol officers were dispatched to a burglary at the 24000 block Van Ry Boulevard. The reporting party was the off-site security company who was monitoring three subjects (one female and two males) on the property via a surveillance camera. The suspects appeared to be tampering with spools of wire. When the three subjects were approached by

officers, they fled on foot. A K-9 track was conducted which yielded in negative results. The suspects are known and further investigation will be conducted.

- Officers responded to an overdose where the patient was not breathing. Officers arrived prior to medics and immediately began life saving measures including CPR and the administration of NARCAN. Officers continued to assist medics until the patient was stabilized and transported to the hospital.
- Officers were dispatched to assist South County Fire with an adult male slumped over the steering wheel of his vehicle in the QFC parking lot. Witnesses had reported a young child in a car seat in the vehicle with the male. None of the witnesses could wake the driver by pounding on the car windows. Upon arrival officers were able to access the vehicle and rouse the male. While speaking with him and observing his behavior probable cause was developed to arrest the male for DUI/physical control. Evidence of very recent narcotics use was evident in the vehicle and the narcotics K9 gave a positive alert to the presence of narcotics in the vehicle.
- Patrol units responded to a CPR-in-progress call at Studio 6 Motel. A 21-year-old male collapsed in the parking lot from a drug overdose. The first arriving officer administered one dose of Naloxone to the patient. South County Fire and Rescue arrived and the patient was revived.
