

## CITY MANAGER'S WEEKLY UPDATE

August 20, 2021

### CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS

In order to limit the spread of COVID-19, the city continues to follow Governor Inslee's [Proclamation 20-28](#) by holding City Council meetings virtually (online), via Zoom.

### COMMUNITY MEETINGS AND EVENTS

- **South County Walks:** The Verdant Health Commission (Snohomish County Public Hospital District #2) is partnering with cities in south Snohomish County to promote good health and fitness through a series of free community walks called "South County Walks." The walks, led by Verdant volunteers, began July 12 and will continue through September 2. Walks are typically two to three miles in length and take about an hour to complete. People of all ages and abilities are encouraged to attend and they are family-friendly!

Mountlake Terrace walks are on Wednesdays through September 1, at 9:30 a.m. at the Recreation Pavilion, 5303 228<sup>th</sup> Street SW. Edmonds walks are on Tuesdays through August 31, at 9:30 a.m. at the Edmonds Waterfront Center, 220 Railroad Avenue.

Lynnwood walks take place on Mondays, through August 30, at 6:00 p.m. at the Verdant Community Wellness Center, 4710 196<sup>th</sup> Street SW and/or Thursdays through September 2, at 6:00 p.m. at the Lynnwood Recreation Center, 18900 44<sup>th</sup> Avenue West.



All participants must complete a South County Walk Registration Form one time before participating so emergency information is available if ever needed. You can drop in at any of these walks and do not need to sign up ahead of time. It's summertime so don't sit, get fit! Moving and interacting with others is a great way to feel better and improve health. ### **CITY CLERK AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS**

- **Update on City Hall Reopening:** With the sharp rise in COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations due to the delta variant, the city will continue to monitor health recommendations from the county and state and plan for reopening for in-person services once the City Hall project is completed and health precautions allow. Although the city received a temporary certificate of occupancy, the contractor has several items to work on and contractors are inside the building working to complete the project.

While progress has been made to secure lobby and plaza furniture, décor, and signage for the project, orders are taking longer to fill due to the pandemic.

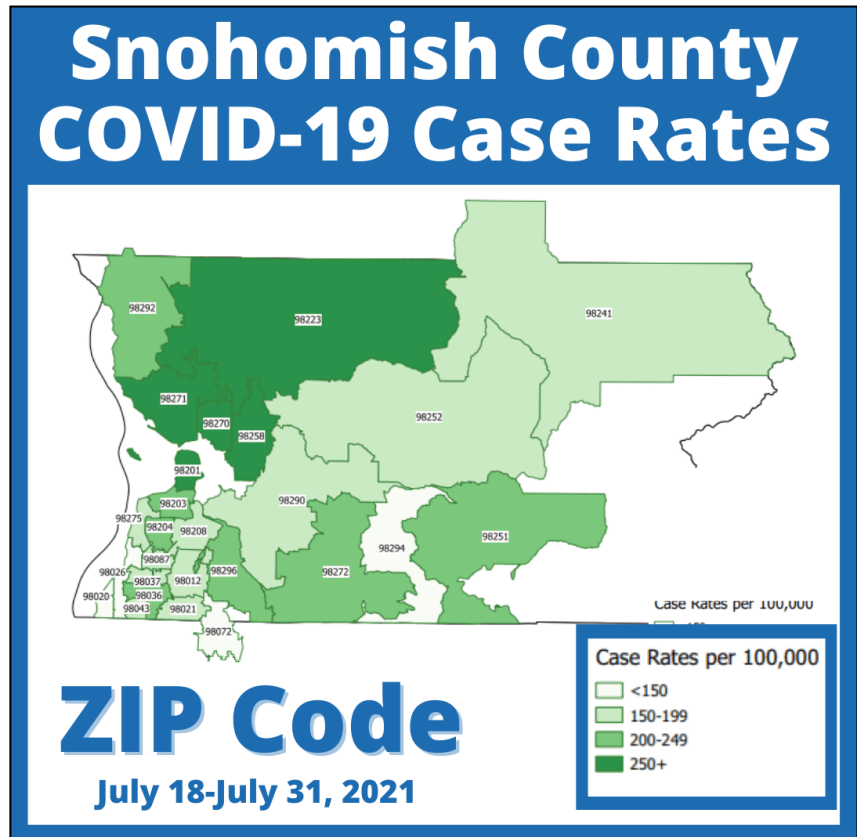
Additionally, plans are in the works for a ribbon cutting ceremony, however with concerns about the increases in COVID-19 cases since July 1, a large-scale community celebration will be postponed due to safety concerns. The city has made arrangements to video a possible ribbon cutting ceremony this fall and share it with the community.

- **Mask Mandates in Place with Record-Breaking COVID-19 Case Counts:** With the delta variant of the virus that causes COVID-19 fueling a sharp rise in cases in Snohomish County, as well as concerns about the hospital system's ability to keep pace, Snohomish County and the State of Washington have mandated masks in indoor settings. Effective, August 12, 2021, the Snohomish Health District directed the following: Everyone age 5 and over must wear a face covering within indoor public spaces. Children 2-4 years old, while exempt from this official directive, are recommended to wear a face covering with the assistance and close supervision of an adult in accordance with the current Order of the Secretary of Health. Everyone in correctional facilities, homeless shelters, schools, childcare, public transportation, and health care settings, including doctor's offices, long-term care, and hospitals, must also wear a well-fitted mask in accord with state requirements already in place.

Additionally, on August 18, Governor Inslee announced that beginning August 23, [everyone — regardless of vaccination status — will be required to wear masks in indoor settings](#). The Department of Health strongly recommends individuals wear masks in crowded outdoor settings, such as concerts, fairs and farmer's markets. The expansion follows record-breaking COVID-19 hospitalization rates, according to Inslee's office. Each of the state's 35 local health officers also recently recommended masking indoors for everyone.

Inslee also announced Wednesday he was expanding the state's vaccination requirements, which last week only included state and health care employees. Now all employees in K-12 schools, most childcare and early learning centers, and higher education must get vaccinated for COVID-19 by October 18. This does not impact students, regardless of age.

In accordance with state and county health recommendations, people who are not yet vaccinated for COVID-19 are encouraged to get vaccinated. Additionally, everyone is urged to continue practicing good hygiene and taking measures to keep our community safe. According to Snohomish Health District, 80% of new cases are occurring among those who have not yet been vaccinated against the virus. The map depicts the distribution of COVID cases and vaccinations by ZIP code as of the end of July.



- **Resources Available for Residents Facing Eviction:** Resources remain available for residents facing possible eviction as the potential end date for the state's moratorium draws closer. Anyone in Snohomish County needing rental assistance can start by calling 211. The 211 call center connects people with human and social services. It is operated by Volunteers of America Western Washington (VOAWW). According to VOAWW, the process takes time, and the demand is growing, so it's important to get started sooner rather than later. Qualified Snohomish County households may be able to receive up to 12 months of assistance, including back rent. Landlords also can be involved in requesting assistance for tenants.

Meanwhile, the City of Mountlake Terrace continues to offer several assistance programs for residents, including utility discounts for seniors and low-income households. For more information, visit [www.cityofmlt.com/165](http://www.cityofmlt.com/165).

- **Site in Mountlake Terrace Examined for Work Release Facility:** The state Department of Corrections (DOC) provided an update at the August 12 Mountlake Terrace City Council work/study session. DOC's interest in locating a work release site in Mountlake Terrace depends on the results of a lengthy review and permitting process.

The state's work release program serves prisoners who are transitioning back into the community during the last six months of their sentence. The focus of the program is on helping them obtain jobs, connect with family, and build life skills, according to DOC. People in the program are governed by a number of rules about their conduct. Violations can result in a return to prison.

The state Legislature has directed DOC to find new sites it can lease for work release in certain regions including Snohomish County. DOC identified a potential property along the Mountlake Terrace/Edmonds border. The site, 7125 224<sup>th</sup> Street SW, is along the Interurban Trail.



Under Washington law, cities cannot prohibit certain “essential facilities,” such as DOC’s work release sites. Mountlake Terrace allows work release facilities in the light industry/office park district in which the proposed property is located. The property is accessed on the west side via a pedestrian bridge, which spans Hall Creek, and on the east side via 70<sup>th</sup> Avenue. If DOC continues having interest in leasing the property for a work release facility, a next step will be for DOC to meet with city staff to discuss the project and identify requirements under state and local building and development codes.

- **Small Business Flex Fund Loans:** On June 30, a program was launched for small business owners and nonprofits across Washington to apply for low interest loans of up to \$150,000 supported by the Washington State Department of Commerce. The fund is a public-private partnership aimed at helping small businesses and nonprofits (particularly those in low-income communities) recover and grow as communities across the state reopen for business. - **Evictions Moratorium and Ban on Utility Shutoffs:** In March, the Governor issued a [Proclamation](#) extending Washington State's moratorium on evictions through September 30, 2021. The moratorium is intended to protect tenants who have fallen behind on their rent because of the economic downturn that arrived with the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, the Governor [extended provisions](#) to ban shutting off utility services to those behind on their payments through September 30.   - **Public Access to City Facilities:** With indoor mask mandates back in place, the city is postponing plans to open City Hall for in-person appointments.

The Recreation Pavilion hours are Monday-Thursday, 5:45 a.m.-8:30 p.m. and Friday 5:45 a.m.-6:30 p.m. The facility is not open on the weekend. ## **COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

- **Permits:** Until the city re-opens for in-person services, [permit applications](#) are accepted through a 'no-contact' procedure. Permit processing times have increased due to compliance with COVID-19 mandates. Call 425-775-9694 to schedule an inspection and have your permit number and address ready. Your project must have issued permits on-site, require workers to be six-feet apart, and have a developed exposure control, mitigation, and recovery plan (Washington State Department of Labor & Industries will enforce requirements for contractors to comply). ## FINANCE

- **New Utility Billing Vendor Selected:** On June 21 the City Council approved a contract with Output Services Group, Inc. (OSG) for utility billing services. The contract with OSG comes following a cyber-attack on the systems of the city's current billing provider, AFTS, which shut down much of the utility billing services.

In response to input from the community, the new contract will include services not previously offered by AFTS. OSG services include text, email and phone notification of new bills, late notices, and payments; auto pay; pay as a guest option; and better tracking of when the statements are mailed by OSG and returned to the payment processing center.

OSG is also establishing payment sites with stores like CVS and 7-Eleven so that customers can make payments when it is most convenient for them. The \$2.00 fee for credit card payments that was in the prior contract will not continue in the contract with OSG. The new contract is approximately \$30,000 *less* per year than.

Since moving into the new City Hall, a utility bill payments drop box has been installed near the front entrance located at 23204 58<sup>th</sup> Avenue W (see photo). Customers may walk or drive up to the drop box.

- **Relief Due to COVID-19 Emergency:** Since March 19, 2020, water service is not being shut off for residential customers' inability to pay during the COVID-19 emergency. The action remains in effect under the state's most recent proclamations addressing the pandemic. No late fees or penalties will apply during this time.

The service fee charged by the vendor for online utility payments has also been suspended for those choosing to pay online. The city recognizes that COVID-19 is a threat to the health of the community, and the ability to frequently wash our hands is paramount in the fight to curb the spread of the virus. As called for by the state and Snohomish Health District, this step will enable the community to ensure proper cleaning measures. **Weekly Patrol Synopsis**

- There were three verbal domestic arguments this week: 4400 block of 212<sup>th</sup> Street SW; 23000 block of 55<sup>th</sup> Avenue W; and 23800 block of 56<sup>th</sup> Avenue W.
- There was one vehicle theft this week: 22100 block of 66<sup>th</sup> Avenue W.
- There were three vehicle prowls this week: 23500 block of 47<sup>th</sup> Place W; 21200 block of 44<sup>th</sup> Avenue W; and 4400 block of 212<sup>th</sup> Street SW.

- On August 11, a resident reported that he was being stalked by multiple subjects through his electronic devices and social media. Officers are waiting for the victim to provide additional information and written statements.

- On August 11, officers responded to the AM/PM for an assault. An unknown male was being rude to an employee and eventually threw several items at him. Case is still under investigation.

- An elderly resident reported that an unknown subject attempted to take over \$100,000 out of his bank account but was unsuccessful.

- On August 13, a domestic assault was reported from several weeks ago. Case is under investigation.
- On August 13, officers were dispatched to the 21500 block of 48<sup>th</sup> Avenue W for a subject who was having a panic attack.

- On August 14, officers were driving through the Interurban Trail and located fresh graffiti. Officers attempted to stop a suspicious person who was nearby but he fled the area.
- On August 14, officers assisted the Lynnwood police with a shots fired call in the 19200 block of Highway 99.
- On August 14, a residential burglary occurred in the 5700 block of 212<sup>th</sup> Street SW where shoes and jewelry were stolen. There are no suspects or leads at this time.
- On August 14, officers transported a suicidal subject to Swedish Edmonds for a voluntary mental health evaluation.

- Officers attempted to stop an occupied stolen vehicle at the Studio 6 Motel. The vehicle fled and was not located.
- Officers assisted South County Fire in responding to an attempted suicide in the 23300 block of Cedar Way. The subject was transported to Swedish Edmonds for a mental health evaluation.
- On August 17, a commercial burglary was reported in the 6600 block of 220<sup>th</sup> Street SW. An unknown subject entered the business after breaking out a window and stole a sum of money.
- On August 17, a burglary occurred in the 4500 block of 220<sup>th</sup> Street SW.
- On August 17, Officer Froisland and K9 Jax assisted the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office with a narcotics investigation.

### **Significant Incidents**

- Officers responded to a call involving an unresponsive elderly female. Upon arrival, the reporting party was hostile towards officers, as medics examined the patient. Officers used various de-escalation tactics and the reporting party calmed down and cooperated with the investigation. The female was declared deceased, following a history of medical problems and declining health.
- A male suspect from a road rage incident in Lynnwood found his way into Mountlake Terrace where he tailgated and eventually bumped into a car. This behavior continued, with the suspect making contact several times with the victim's vehicle before the victim attempted to evade the suspect. The suspect followed the victim until she got to her home. The suspect then exited his car before a passenger in the victim's car and several neighbors yelled for the suspect to leave.

The suspect sped off and, based on skid marks, drove recklessly down a dead-end street before ultimately driving off a 10-15 foot ravine bordering Terrace Creek Park. The vehicle came to rest and the suspect fled again on foot into the park.

An area check was initiated with supporting agencies' assistance. A Snohomish County Sheriff's deputy working in Brier located the male on a trail near the crash site hiding in the bushes.

Video from the Lynnwood incident confirmed the suspect was the same in each subsequent incident. The male showed no signs of intoxication or injury. He was booked in County jail for multiple charges.

- Patrol responded to reports of gunshots being heard and cars speeding in an area. Upon arrival several shell casings were found in the street. A canvas of the area did not turn up any victims. Surveillance shows two vehicles speeding down the street and sounds of gunshots.

Investigation revealed the subjects may have been denied entry into a nearby party, and possibly were arguing with each other. Subjects at the party were contacted and cooperative, however no one was able to provide identifying information about the subjects who were denied entry. Investigation is ongoing.
