In order to limit the spread of COVID-19, the city continues to follow Governor Inslee's [Proclamation 20-28](#) by holding City Council meetings virtually (online), via Zoom.

CITY CLERK AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS

- **Civic Campus Dedication:** A dedication ceremony was held Saturday to commemorate the new Mountlake Terrace Civic Campus, with attendance limited by COVID-19 precautions. The outdoor event included community leaders from throughout the city's history, along with a number of federal, state and regional officials. As recently as last month, the city had anticipated holding a larger community celebration, but that plan was postponed due to the sharp rise in COVID-19 cases.

“We are extremely proud of our new Civic Campus that is welcoming and reflects the residents’ ideas on design and cost,” Mayor Kyoko Matsumoto Wright said. “It has taken more than a decade to get to this point, but the community’s patience has paid off with this

beautiful campus.” Long in the works, the \$12.5 million Civic Campus redevelopment project was funded by a 2017 voter-approved bond measure, as well as park impact fees and donations toward the fountain and artwork. Voter support was successful in large part due to the work of the City Hall Advisory Committee, made up of nine residents who worked with the community on the initial project concepts. Public input greatly shaped the size and style of the building, as well as the project layout, scope and cost.

Saturday's event featured a ribbon cutting and the revealing of two commemorative plaques — one memorializing Mayor Smith and one recognizing the community input, design team and city officials.

Guests were treated to a viewing of a new video showing the city's history of civic pride and city facilities over the years leading to the new City Hall. - **Overnight Closures of 236th Street SW Start Monday:** From Monday, September 27 through Thursday, October 14, from 11:00 p.m.-5:00 a.m., Sound Transit's contractor will work at night and at 236th Street SW and the northbound I-5 off-ramp to continue to build the elevated trackway.

236th Street SW will be closed; vehicles must turn left on 56th Avenue W, right onto 244th Street W and continue on to I-5. Detours will be provided (see map).

Emergency vehicles and buses will be allowed through the closure. The contractor has obtained a Temporary Noise Variance to complete this work.

- **City Instagram:** The city has refreshed its Instagram account with some new content and will be doing the same on YouTube over the next few months. - **Update on City Hall Reopening:** With the sharp rise in COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations due to the delta variant, the city will continue to monitor health recommendations from the county and state and plan for reopening for in-person services once the City Hall project is completed and health precautions allow.

Although the city received a temporary certificate of occupancy, the contractor has several items to work on and contractors are periodically inside the building working to complete the project. While progress has been made to secure lobby and plaza furniture, décor, and signage for the project, orders are taking longer to fill due to the pandemic. For these reasons, City Hall and the Police Station are not yet open to the public, with the exception of appointments related to specific services.

- **Mask Mandates in Place with Record-Breaking Case Counts:** With the delta variant of the virus that causes COVID-19 fueling a sharp rise in cases in Snohomish County, as well as concerns about the hospital system's ability to keep pace, Snohomish County and the State of Washington have mandated masks in indoor settings. Effective, August 12, 2021, the Snohomish Health District directed the following: Everyone age 5 and over must wear a face covering within indoor public spaces. Children 2-4 years old, while exempt from this official directive, are recommended to wear a face covering with the assistance and close supervision of an adult in accordance with the current Order of the Secretary of Health. Everyone in correctional facilities, homeless shelters, schools, childcare, public transportation, and health care settings, including doctor's offices, long-term care, and hospitals, must also wear a well-fitted mask in accord with state requirements already in place.

Additionally, Governor Inslee announced that as of August 23, [everyone-regardless of vaccination status-is required to wear masks in indoor settings](#). The Department of Health strongly recommends individuals wear masks in crowded outdoor settings, such as concerts, fairs and farmer's markets. The expansion follows record-breaking COVID-19 hospitalization rates, according to the Governor's office. Each of the state's 35 local health officers also recently recommended masking indoors for everyone.

Governor Inslee has expanded the state's vaccination requirements, which includes state and health care employees. Now all employees in K-12 schools, most childcare and early learning centers, and higher education must get vaccinated for COVID-19 by October 18. This does not impact students, regardless of age.

In accordance with state and county health recommendations, people who are not yet vaccinated for COVID-19 are encouraged to get vaccinated. Additionally, everyone is urged to continue practicing good hygiene and taking measures to keep our community safe.

- **Resources Available for Residents Facing Eviction:** Resources remain available for residents facing possible eviction as the potential end date for the state's moratorium draws closer. Anyone in Snohomish County needing rental assistance can start by calling 211. The 211 call center connects people with human and social services. It is operated by Volunteers of America Western Washington. The process takes time, and the demand is growing, so it is important to get started sooner rather than later. Qualified Snohomish County households may be able to receive up to 12 months of assistance, including back rent. Landlords also can be involved in requesting assistance for tenants.

Meanwhile, the city continues to offer assistance programs for residents, including utility discounts for seniors and low-income households. More information is available [online](#).

- **Small Business Flex Fund Loans:** On June 30, a program was launched for small business owners and nonprofits across Washington to apply for low interest loans of up to \$150,000 supported by the Washington State Department of Commerce. The fund is a public-private partnership aimed at helping small businesses and nonprofits (particularly those in low-income communities) recover and grow as communities across the state reopen for business. - **Evictions Moratorium and Ban on Utility Shutoffs:** In March, the Governor issued a [Proclamation](#) extending Washington State's moratorium on evictions through October 31, 2021. The moratorium is intended to protect tenants who have fallen behind on their rent because of the economic downturn that arrived with the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, the Governor [extended provisions](#) to ban shutting off utility services to those behind on their payments through September 30. - **Public Access to City Facilities:** With indoor mask mandates back in place, the city is postponing plans to open City Hall for in-person appointments.

The Recreation Pavilion hours are Monday-Thursday, 5:45 a.m.-8:30 p.m. and Friday 5:45 a.m.-6:30 p.m. The facility is not open on the weekend. Email mltrecreation@mltwa.gov or call 425-776-9173 to register or get more information about our programs. Athletic fields are open by reservation only and with appropriate safety plans. Park trails, off-leash dog park, tennis courts and basketball court are open.

- **Permits:** Until the city re-opens for in-person services, [permit applications](#) are accepted through a 'no-contact' procedure. Permit processing times have increased due to compliance with COVID-19 mandates. Call 425-775-9694 to schedule an inspection and have your permit number and address ready. Your project must have issued permits on-site, require workers to be six-feet apart, and have a developed exposure control, mitigation, and recovery plan (Washington State Department of Labor & Industries will enforce requirements for contractors to comply). FINANCE

- **Utility Billing Vendor:** On June 21, the City Council approved a contract with Output Services Group, Inc. (OSG) for utility billing services. The contract with OSG comes following a cyber-attack on the systems of the city's current billing provider, AFTS, which shut down much of the utility billing services.

In response to input from the community, the new contract will include services not previously offered by AFTS. OSG services include text, email and phone notification of new bills, late notices, and payments; auto pay; pay as a guest option; and better tracking of when the statements are mailed by OSG and returned to the payment processing center.

OSG is also establishing payment sites with stores like CVS and 7-Eleven so that customers can make payments when it is most convenient for them. The \$2.00 fee for credit card payments that was in the prior contract will not continue in the contract with OSG. The new contract is approximately \$30,000 *less* per year than.

Since moving into the new City Hall, a utility bill payments drop box has been installed near the front entrance located at 23204 58th Avenue W (see photo). Customers may walk or drive up to the drop box.

- **Relief Due to COVID-19 Emergency:** Since March 19, 2020, water service is not being shut off for residential customers' inability to pay during the COVID-19 emergency. The action remains in effect under the state's most recent proclamations addressing the pandemic. No late fees or penalties will apply during this time.

The service fee charged by the vendor for online utility payments has also been suspended for those choosing to pay online. The city recognizes that COVID-19 is a threat to the health of the community, and the ability to frequently wash our hands is paramount in the fight to curb the spread of the virus. As called for by the state and Snohomish Health District, this step will enable the community to ensure proper cleaning measures. We encourage customers to continue to make their payments or to contact Utility Billing at utilitybilling@mltwa.gov or 425-744-6214 or to make payment arrangements, if they are unable to pay at this time.

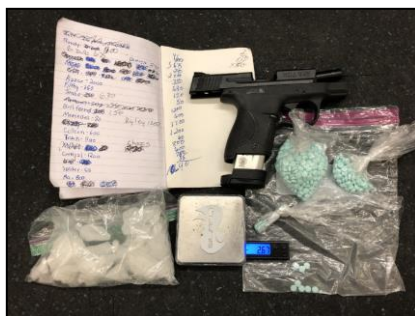

Significant Case
