CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS

In order to limit the spread of COVID-19, the city continues to follow Governor Inslee's [Proclamation 20-28](#) by holding City Council meetings virtually (online), via Zoom.

CITY CLERK AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS

- **Purple Lights Show Support For Victims of Domestic Violence:** The Mountlake Terrace Police Department is offering purple light bulbs to help residents show support during October, Domestic Violence Awareness Month. This is the 14th year the city has participated in the campaign called Purple Light Nights®. Having the lights visible in homes lets victims and survivors know they are not alone. The effort is meant to bring hope to those suffering from abuse by a partner or family member. It also seeks to honor survivors and remember those lost. Community recognition of domestic violence as a social issue can help counter the sense of isolation and shame that abusers use as a form of control.

Residents can use any purple light (black light) bulb. Mountlake Terrace Police have a limited supply for those in city limits. These bulbs may work best in a window-facing lamp if there are any concerns about the front porch or entryway remaining well-lit.

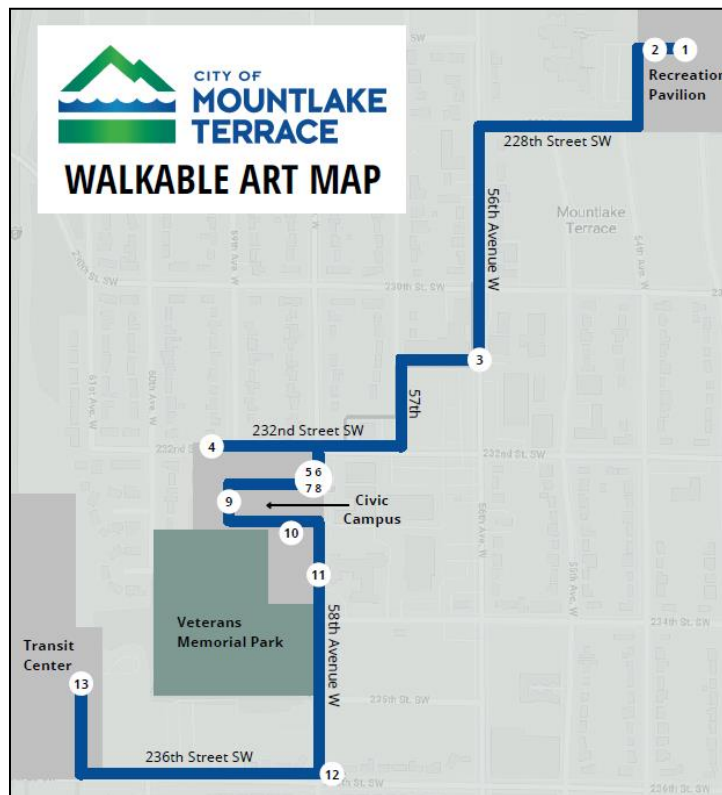


Our officers encourage people to call 911 if they see or hear anything that might be violence in a household. For those looking to get more involved, consider contacting local shelters and

nonprofits about donation and volunteering needs. Many of those organizations have been affected by the pandemic. - **Trunk or Treat:** The Mountlake Terrace Business Association is planning to hold their annual Trunk or Treat event on Sunday, October 31 from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. at the parking lot near the corner of 56th Avenue West and 232nd Street SW. The Mountlake Terrace Police Department will be participating and city employees are contributing funds to purchase candy for the event. Masks are required for all participants.
- **Stay Active And View Artwork With New MLT Art Map:** A new interactive map shows

how to find publicly viewable art in Mountlake Terrace. In fact, almost every public art installation here can be seen on a two-mile roundtrip walk or drive through the city's downtown core. Artwork included on the map is mostly owned by the city, with additions from Community Transit and muralist Andrew Morrison. Private property was only added if those items are easily viewed outdoors from public areas. The map was inspired by city staff seeing community members stop by and enjoy the collection of public art at the new Civic Campus, especially families. - **Veterans Memorial Park Conceptual Illustration:** At a special meeting held on October 4, the Mountlake Terrace City Council walked the trails at Veterans Memorial Park in anticipation of an upcoming meeting scheduled for October 18 to consider a resolution confirming the conceptual illustration in the [preferred plan](#). This concept is a component of the [Veterans Memorial Park Master Plan](#) and the more comprehensive [Recreation Parks](#)



[and Open Space Plan](#) (“RPOS”) scheduled for adoption in early 2022. The concept is under consideration now so the city can begin design.

- **Overnight Closures of 236th Street SW Continue:** Sound Transit’s contractor will work from 11:00 p.m. on October 16 to 5:00 a.m. on October 17 at 236th Street SW and the northbound I-5 off-ramp to continue to build the elevated trackway. 236th Street SW will be closed and detours will be in place (see map).

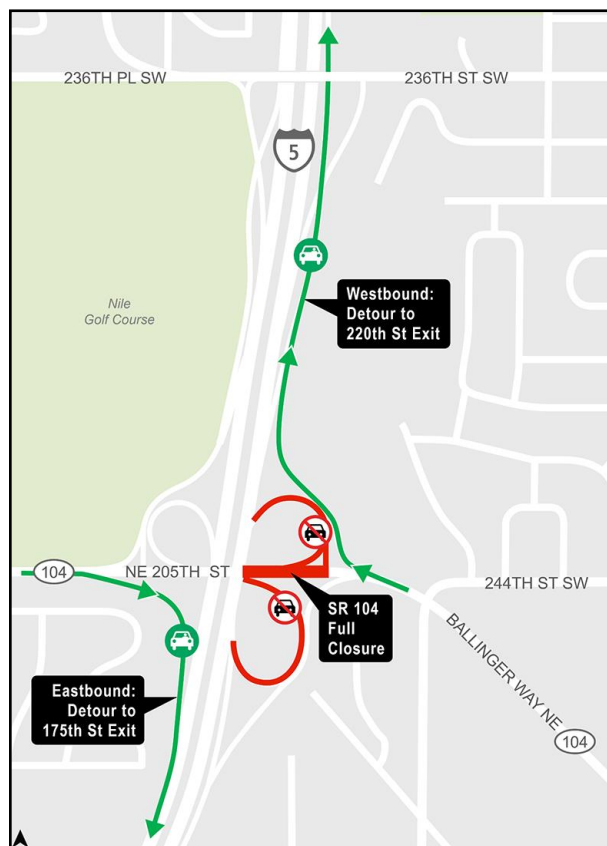
Emergency vehicles and buses will be allowed through the closure. The contractor has obtained a Temporary Noise Variance to complete this work.

- **Sound Transit Night Work along I-5 and State Route 104 Interchange:** As early as Monday, October 18, Sound Transit’s contractor will begin a night operation along the I-5 and the SR 104 Interchange in Shoreline to complete concrete pours for the elevated guideway for the future Lynnwood Link Extension. This work will include a full closure of SR 104 as well as on-ramp closures. Detours will be provided (see map for the full closure detour). The contractor has obtained a Temporary Noise Variance to complete this work. This work is weather-dependent and may need to be rescheduled. Schedule:

- Overnight full closures of SR 104 October 18-21 from 10:00 p.m.-7:00 a.m. each night (see map for detour route).
- Overnight closures of the on-ramp from Eastbound SR 104 October 25-28 from 10:00 p.m.-7:00 a.m. each night.



- **Apply Now For Lodging Tax Grants For Events, Tourism:** Financial support is available for organizations planning community events and festivals in Mountlake Terrace. The city has \$25,000 in lodging tax funds available to qualified applicants for projects and events that promote tourism in 2022. These funds come from the taxes collected from Studio 6 Hotel in Mountlake Terrace.

Lodging tax funds must be used for marketing or operation of special events designed to attract tourists from more than 50 miles away. They may also support the operations of tourism-related facilities owned or operated by nonprofit organizations according to law.

Programs or events should have the potential to increase overnight visits to Studio 6 and/or create a positive economic impact. Lodging tax funds have helped support community events such as the 3rd of July Fireworks event, Tour de Terrace and Arts of the Terrace.

- **Update on City Hall Reopening:** With the continued high level of COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations, combined with the contractor continuing to complete the punch list of items to finish the project, City Hall and the Police Station remain closed to the public for in-person business with the exception of appointments related to specific services. The city will continue to monitor health recommendations from the county and state and plan for reopening for in-person services once the City Hall project is completed and health precautions allow.
- **Governor Extends Eviction Moratorium:** Governor Jay Inslee [announced](#) that the state's eviction moratorium has been extended through October 31, 2021. Resources remain available for residents facing possible eviction as the state's moratorium draws closer to ending. Anyone in Snohomish County needing rental assistance can start by calling 211. The 211 call center connects people with human and social services. It is operated by Volunteers of America Western Washington. The process takes time, and the demand is growing, so it is important to get started sooner rather than later. Qualified Snohomish County households may be able to receive up to 12 months of assistance, including back rent. Landlords also can be involved in requesting assistance for tenants.

- **City Instagram Promotes Jobs:** The city has refreshed its Instagram account with some new content and will be doing the same on YouTube over the next few months. - **Small Business Flex Fund Loans:** On June 30, a program was launched for small business owners and nonprofits across Washington to apply for low interest loans of up to \$150,000 supported by the Washington State Department of Commerce. The fund is a public-private partnership aimed at helping small businesses and nonprofits (particularly those in low-income communities) recover and grow as communities across the state reopen for business. - **Public Access to City Facilities:** With indoor mask mandates back in place, the city is postponing plans to open City Hall for in-person appointments.

Park trails, off-leash dog park, tennis courts and basketball court are open.

COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- **Comprehensive Plan Applications Due October 29:** Applications to amend the city's Comprehensive Plan in 2022 are due by 4:30 p.m. on Friday, October 29. Application forms are available online at www.cityofmlt.com/172. An application fee applies. The Comprehensive Plan is a broad-based 20-year plan that guides the city's livability. It includes goals, policies, and a map indicating the locations of land use districts (such as single family, community business, or industrial areas). With limited exceptions, the city may update its Comprehensive Plan no more than once a year. It is anticipated that the next update will be completed by the end of June.

- **Permits:** Until the city re-opens for in-person services, [permit applications](#) are accepted through a 'no-contact' procedure. Permit processing times have increased due to compliance with COVID-19 mandates. Call 425-775-9694 to schedule an inspection and have your permit number and address ready. Your project must have issued permits on-site, require workers to be six-feet apart, and have a developed exposure control, mitigation, and recovery plan (Washington State Department of Labor & Industries will enforce requirements for contractors to comply). FINANCE

- **Utility Billing Vendor:** On June 21, the City Council approved a contract with Output Services Group, Inc. (OSG) for utility billing services. The contract with OSG comes following a cyber-attack on the systems of the city's current billing provider, AFTS, which shut down much of the utility billing services.

In response to input from the community, the new contract will include services not previously offered by AFTS. OSG services include text, email and phone notification of new bills, late notices, and payments; auto pay; pay as a guest option; and better tracking of when the statements are mailed by OSG and returned to the payment processing center.

OSG is also establishing payment sites with stores like CVS and 7-Eleven so that customers can make payments when it is most convenient for them. The \$2.00 fee for credit card payments that was in the prior contract will not continue in the contract with OSG. The new contract is approximately \$30,000 *less* per year than.

Weekly Patrol Synopsis

- There were six verbal domestic arguments this week: 5600 block of 220th Street SW (two incidents), 23400 block of Lakeview Drive, 4000 block of 212th Street SW, 5100 block of 230th Street SW, and 4500 block of 224th Pl. SW.
- There were two vehicle prowls this week: 24300 block of 59th Avenue W and 23500 block of 56th Avenue W.
- There was one vehicle theft this week: 22400 block of 70th Avenue W.
- On October 6, an unknown person broke a window at the Bethel Chapel located at the 23000 block of 66 Avenue West.
- On October 7, detectives arrested a subject who failed to register as a sex offender in the city.
- On October 7, a hit-and-run was reported at the 21800 block of 58th Avenue W. There are no suspects or leads at this time.
- A passerby reported a two-car collision in the 6000 block of 220th Street SW. Both vehicles were gone upon officers' arrival.
- A resident was contacted by a neighbor who asked to call for help for an unknown situation. Investigation revealed a domestic assault had occurred. A male and female got into an argument, and the male assaulted the female. A K9 was deployed to locate the suspect with negative results. Charges filed with the court.
- On October 8, officers responded to the 4100 block of 212th Street SW for a report of a suicidal subject. Officers contacted the subject and later transported him to Swedish Edmonds hospital for a mental health evaluation.
- On October 8, a mail theft was reported at the 4700 block of 228th Street SW. There are no suspects or leads at this time.
- On October 6, officers responded to Mountlake Terrace High School for a report of a stolen bicycle.

- On October 7, officers were dispatched to a hit-and-run at the Safeway located at the 4300 block 212th Street Southwest. There was video evidence of the hit-and-run, and the case is still under investigation.
- On October 9, officers contacted a juvenile who was having suicidal thoughts. He was transported to Swedish Edmonds hospital for a mental health evaluation.
- A female was contacted after calling 9-1-1 and telling dispatch that she believed she was hearing voices in her head. She refused medical treatment. The individual stated she would go to the doctor the next day.
- Edmonds police responded to an alarm at Burlington Coat Factory. The responding unit observed broken glass/forced entry. Mountlake Terrace units assisted with containment for a K9 track. The suspect was not located.
- A female crashed her car into a light pole and an unoccupied parked vehicle. She then drove into the parking garage of the Arbor Village complex. The intoxicated driver stumbled out of her car and fell over hitting her head on concrete. Prescription pills were found next to the driver and her car was filled with open alcohol containers. The driver was seen by medics and released to police who then arrested the driver for DUI. A search warrant to inspect the vehicle was applied for and granted by a judge. The driver was taken to the hospital and subsequently booked into Snohomish County Jail.
- Edmonds police located a felony warrant subject in Mountlake Terrace while doing a from a vehicle check. The subject was believed to be shopping inside Safeway. A Mountlake Terrace unit assisted in locating the suspect who was taken into custody without incident by Edmonds.
- A two-car collision occurred in the 6000 block of 220th Street SW. Both cars were totaled. One of the drivers was arrested on suspicion of DUI. A search warrant was applied for and granted. The subject was transported to the hospital for medical clearance and then booked into the Snohomish County Jail.
- Safeway had a male who loaded up a shopping cart with several cases of beer valued at around \$300 dollars and then walked out of the store without paying. Investigation has developed some leads.
- A two-car collision occurred near the transit center on 236th Street SW. Both cars were totaled. One of the drivers was suspected of DUI and subsequently arrested. The suspect was taken to the hospital and then booked for DUI.
- October 9, a hit-and-run occurred at the 21400 block of 52nd Avenue W. There are no suspects or leads at this time.

- On October 10, officers responded to the 6300 block of St. Albion Way for a physical domestic. Two male subjects got into a physical fight over a female. Probable cause was developed to arrest one of the male subjects for assault. He was booked into jail.
- On October 11, a window was broken out in the 6100 block of St. Albion Way.
