CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS

In order to limit the spread of COVID-19, the city continues to follow Governor Inslee's [Proclamation 20-28](#) by holding City Council meetings virtually (online), via Zoom.

CITY CLERK AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS

- **Recreation Pavilion Removes Mask Requirement:** In line with the state's guidance, as of March 12 customers at the Recreation Pavilion are not required to wear facemasks. However, the city still recommends mask use, and anyone who chooses to remain masked may do so.
- **Update on City Hall Reopening:** Meeting tables and chairs for the City Council Chambers arrived last week as well as new furniture for the City Hall lobby and workspaces. The City Clerk and IT Manager continue to work on video streaming future in-person Council meetings. Lobby signage has been ordered, and departments are preparing for the eventual reopening once construction punch list items are completed.
- **DEI Commission Presentation from Alliance for Housing Affordability:** Chris Collier, program manager of the Alliance for Housing Affordability (AHA), was a guest speaker at the March 16 Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Commission meeting. The Alliance consists of 13 cities, including Mountlake Terrace, along with Snohomish County and the [Housing Authority of Snohomish County](#). Its aim is to increase affordable housing supply throughout the region. Mountlake Terrace Mayor Kyoko Matsumoto Wright and Councilmember Erin Murray are active members of this group, representing the city and building partnerships. At the meeting, Collier covered why housing has become so expensive, why those costs continue to rise, and talked about how to address these complex issues in our community.

The [Mountlake Terrace Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Commission](https://www.cityofmlt.com/DEIC) meets at 7:00 p.m. via Zoom on the third Wednesday of each month. Its mission is promoting and embracing diversity through action, education and guidance. - **City Receives Award for Employee Wellness Efforts:** For the fourth year in a row, the City of Mountlake Terrace has received the WellCity Award from the Association of Washington Cities (AWC) for promoting employee health. This accomplishment involved meeting 29 wellness requirements for the city to earn a 2 percent discount on its medical premiums. This occurred through the AWC Employee Benefit Trust, a local government benefit pool.

The award recognizes that employees who value and maintain good health are happier, less stressed, and use fewer sick days. The city benefits from reduced healthcare costs, improved employee health, increased productivity, higher morale, and better retention, which benefits taxpayers and the public good. AWC also notes that these wellness initiatives took place during the second year of a pandemic.



- **Mountlake Terrace Honored for Commitment to Urban Forest:** The City of Mountlake Terrace has been recognized as a Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation for work done in 2021. This award honors the city's commitment to effective urban forest management.

The Tree City USA program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation, in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service and the National Association of State Foresters. The city met four requirements: a local tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of a certain threshold, and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

Trees are community assets that improve visual appeal, property values, air pollutants and wildlife habitat, among other benefits. - **New Low Interest Loan Program Opportunity:** The Small Business Flex Fund is a new resource to help grow businesses and is supported by the Washington State Department of Commerce. It is a low-interest loan specifically for small businesses and nonprofits in Washington state.

The pandemic has impacted all our communities, but it has been especially hard on Washington's smallest businesses and nonprofits. The Small Business Flex Fund is designed to help small business owners and nonprofits access funds at a competitive interest rate so they can bounce back stronger than ever.

A truly small business-friendly loan, you will experience low interest rates, longer payback timelines, and community-based lenders with decades of experience helping Washington's small businesses and nonprofits thrive. Loan terms include: 3%-4% interest rates; no fees & interest-only payments for the first year; 60-month loan terms; no collateral is required; and 60-month loan term. The funds can be used for: payroll; rent and utilities; building improvements/repairs; marketing and advertising; supplies, and other business expenses.

The Small Business Flex Fund, developed in response to COVID-19, is designed to get financial support into the hands of Washington State's smallest businesses and nonprofits. To be eligible to apply, small businesses and nonprofits must employ 50 or fewer full-time equivalent (FTE) employees, have annual revenues of less than \$3 million per year, and experience a direct economic disruption as a result of COVID-19. - **Vouchers Available for Swim Lessons:** Swim lesson vouchers have recently been distributed to all third graders in the Edmonds School District in collaboration with [Verdant Health Commission](#) and south Snohomish County cities. Verdant Health Commission's grant provides three vouchers per third grader redeemable at the Recreation Pavilion pool.

This program aims to provide greater access to swim lessons, allowing students to improve their swimming abilities and to be more knowledgeable in and around the water. For students (K-12) who are not in third grade, non-swimmer vouchers provided by the grant are also available at the Pavilion pool. Registration is available online via the [Dash](#).

Vouchers for third grade students are redeemable for swim lessons, levels 1-4. The non-swimmer/beginner vouchers are for anyone in the Edmonds School District, K-12, for level 1 or tadpole lessons.

If you wish to utilize the free swim vouchers, please enroll and pay online and bring your vouchers to the Pavilion by the end of your child's first swim lesson for a refund.



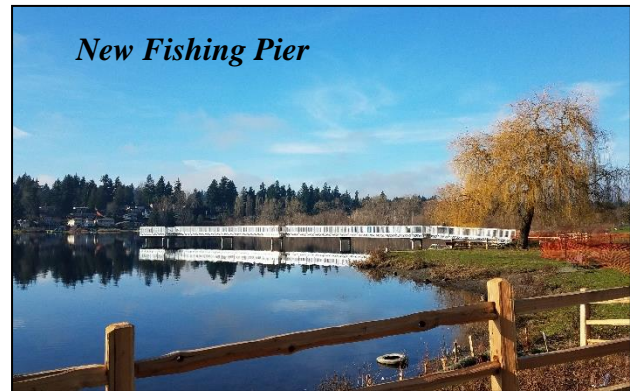

- **Ballinger Park Waterfront Re-Opens After Renovations:** The Ballinger Park waterfront opened two weeks ago after being closed since the summer. The updated waterfront features a new 220-foot aluminum fishing pier, boat launch, dock, restrooms and other amenities. The city thanks the community for their patience during the closure.

Some fencing will remain on site to protect new plantings that remain vulnerable. Please follow all posted signs as the crews wrap up remaining tasks.

Construction started in July on improvements totaling nearly \$1.5 million, much of it funded by grants. The project focused on active waterfront recreation on the east side of Lake Ballinger with quiet activities on the west side. It is important to note that fishing should take place on the new pier and not the boat launch.

Many of the amenities were originally installed in the 1970s, and the park needed to better account for modern standards around accessibility and habitat protection. This year will bring [construction of a Universally Accessible Playground](#) nearby. A separate project, on the west side of the park, involves new trails and a wildlife viewing platform, along with [a realignment of Hall Creek](#) for habitat restoration. Designs are nearing completion, with construction expected in 2023.

COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- **Inspection Requests Move Exclusively Online:** As of March 14, the city requires all inspections to be requested via the [Permit Portal](#). The city continues to make an effort to provide consistency and expedite the inspection scheduling process, and consolidating permits and inspections through the portal streamlines this progression.

The former Inspection Hotline will redirect callers to the portal. Additionally, all permit information is housed online, in the same place, and can be accessed by using the permit number. Information regarding the necessity of inspections, and staying in compliance with the accompanying permits, is located on the [Permits & Licenses](#) page.

- **Mountlake Terrace Updates Development and Impact Fees:** On January 1, updated development and impact fees went into effect. These fees pay for the review, permitting and inspection of land use and construction projects. Impact fees are used to fund the costs of development-related improvements to parks and roads. The Mountlake Terrace City Council approved these fee increases on December 6. Fees for most programs will increase to bring rates in line with the cost of providing services.

The development fees apply to all new permit applications received on or after January 1, 2022. Impact fees are applied when permits are issued. - **Permits:** Until the city re-opens for in-person services, [permit applications](#) are accepted through a 'no-contact' procedure. Permit processing times have increased due to compliance with COVID mandates. During your work, permits must be on-site, workers must following COVID-19 protocols, and contractors must have a developed exposure control, mitigation, and recovery plan (Department of Labor & Industries will enforce requirements for contractors to comply). Weekly Patrol Synopsis

- There was one verbal domestic arguments this week: 4900 block of 221st Street SW.
- There were two vehicle prowls this week: 23800 block of 59th Place W and 23500 block of 53rd Avenue W.
- There was one vehicle theft this week: 24000 block of Van Ry BLVD
- There was one warrant arrest this week: 23200 block of 58th Avenue W.
- There were two stolen vehicle recoveries this week: 21300 block of 48th Avenue W and 24300 block of 54th Avenue W.
- Officers stopped a vehicle for failing to stop at a stop sign located in the 6400 block of 218th Street SW. The male subject fled the scene on foot. The subject was in violation of a 'No Contact Order' by being within 1,000 feet of the residence of the person in the order. Probable caused was established against the male for violation of a court order and for failing to obey an officer.
- On March 10, officers were investigating a burglary report. The investigation revealed that one of the victim's stolen bikes was for sale on Facebook Marketplace. Officers worked with Bothell detectives and were eventually able to get the stolen bikes and arrest a suspect.
- A hit-and-run was reported in the 24300 block of 56th Avenue W.

- On March 10, two male subjects got into a physical fight causing minor injuries to each person. Both subjects did not wish to pursue any charges.
- On March 10, officers offered the assistance of a drone to the Edmonds Police Department for a safety sweep during an assault with a weapon call.
- A sexual assault was reported to a patrol officer on March 10. The case has been assigned to detectives.
- Officers responded to the 4100 block of 236th Street SW for a report of a suicidal female. Officers made contact with the individual at her residence. Following discussion, she was given resources and officers cleared the scene.
- Officers responded to a death investigation in the 6300 block of St. Albion Way. A female subject was found deceased at the scene. She appeared to have died due to several medical conditions.
- Two known juveniles appeared to have used spray-painted property in the 5600 block of 216th Place SW.
- On March 13, several juveniles were causing a disturbance inside a business located in the 21200 block of 44th Avenue W. One of the juveniles was arrested for trespassing and brought home to his parents.

- Officers arrested a subject for being in possession of a stolen motorcycle. He also had several warrants for his arrest.

Significant Incidents

- On March 9, patrol took a burglary report at Andorra Apartments where two high-valued bicycles and other equipment was stolen. The victim found the bicycles for sale on Facebook Marketplace. An officer began working with the victim to coordinate a meet with the suspect who was identified as a resident of the same complex. A meet was set with the assistance of two Bothell detectives who held probable cause for two counts of burglary on the same suspect, and also had probable cause on his girlfriend.

Officers contacted the suspect at the meet location and took him into custody without incident, recovering one of the stolen bicycles. He was transported to the Mountlake Terrace Police Department where he was interviewed about a list of crimes. Contact was made at the apartment where the girlfriend was also taken into custody by Bothell police. Consent was later given to enter the apartment where they recovered some of the stolen property (including an \$8,000 desk), as well as additional stolen property. The suspect was booked into the Snohomish County Jail for trafficking stolen property.

- Patrol responded to a robbery with a firearm at the 7-Eleven. A suspect had pointed a firearm at the clerk and demanded cash. The suspect fled with an amount of money. Officers and K-9 were quickly on scene and began a track, which led to the area of the Maple Glenn Apartments where it is believed the suspect had a vehicle waiting. Evidence was collected and investigation is ongoing.

Code Enforcement Property of the Week

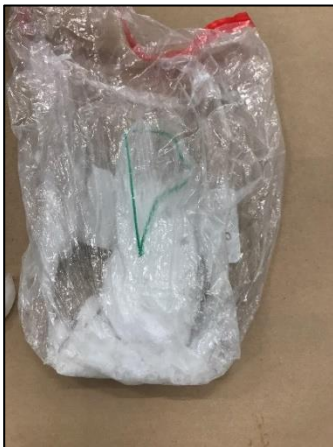
