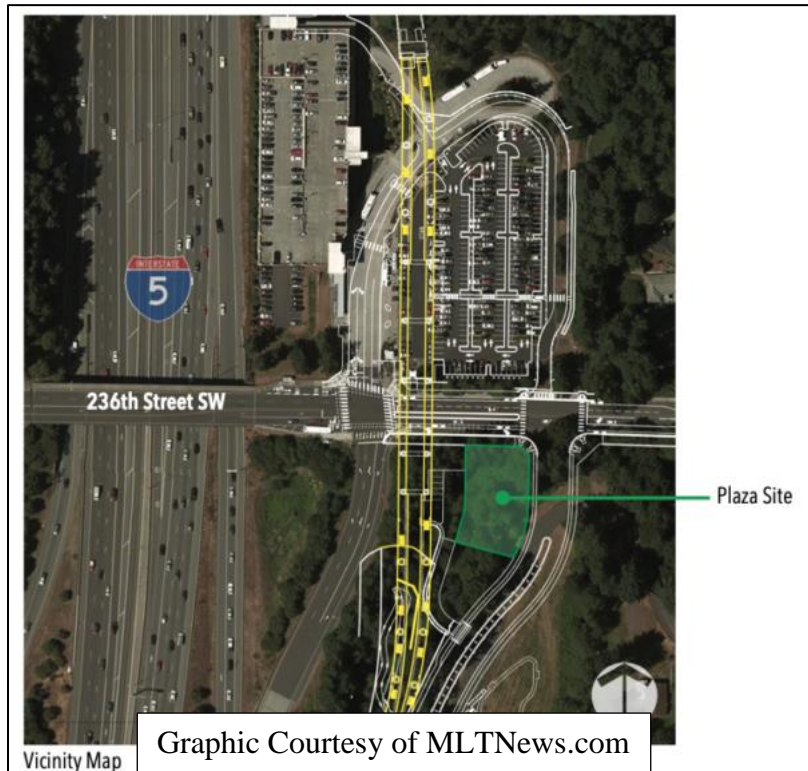
- **Join Us For April Pools Day:** April Pool's Day is an event that provides information on boating and open water safety, first aid, cold and deep water preparedness, life jacket fittings and use training along with fun interactive stations. Join us next **Saturday, April 9, 11:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.** at the Pavilion Pool, 5303 228th Street SW. This year you can also create your own floatation device and take our lifeguard challenge course!

Those who complete all the stations will receive a free pass to the open swim that begins at 12:15 p.m. The Washington State Parks & Recreation Commission Boating Program will provide free lifejackets to the first 30 participants that complete the water safety stations. As part of a Verdant Health Commission grant, any non-swimmer in the Edmonds School District, grades K-12, tested at level 1 is eligible to receive vouchers for three free swim lesson sessions. - **City Happenings in Mailboxes Now:** The April issue of the city newsletter, featuring the Concern for Neighbors Food Bank on the cover, was mailed this week. This newsletter includes a two-page spread highlighting upcoming projects at Ballinger Park. It also includes reminders for park visitors such as adhering to leash law. - **Federal Budget Adds \$2M for Mountlake Terrace Trails, Light Rail Plaza:**

Transit connections in the Mountlake Terrace Town Center received a major boost when the President signed the 2022 federal budget into law. Within the budget, U.S. Rep. Rick Larsen secured \$2 million to support the Transit Connection Corridor Project. This project will construct a pedestrian plaza next to the future light rail station, and add well-lit, paved trails throughout Veterans Memorial Park. The initiative provides important links to the Civic Campus, 58th Avenue W and 60th Avenue W, with a primary trail that's ADA-accessible. The federal investment comes as the region prepares for light rail to begin service to south



Snohomish County in 2024. Long in the works, the plaza and trails have drawn funding from a variety of sources, including \$2.5 million from Sound Transit and another \$577,581 federal Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program grant awarded by the Puget Sound Regional Council. The additional \$2 million is the final funding needed to complete the project, and the city expects to begin construction in 2023.

“[Gateway Plaza](#)” is designed as a 2,000-square-foot space that will welcome light rail passengers to Mountlake Terrace, their first stop in the county. Nearby, Veterans Memorial Park is an 8.3-acre urban forest with a playground, gazebo, veteran memorial and other amenities. [Future improvements](#) include adding restrooms and replacing the playground and gazebo with new structures. - **Volunteers Needed for Earth Day/Arbor Day Clean Up:** The city will host a spring cleanup event in honor of Arbor Day and Earth Day on **Saturday, April 23 from 9:00 a.m. to noon** at the Civic Campus, located at 23204 58th Avenue W. Volunteers will work at the Civic Campus and Library areas and assist a volunteer group known as the “Ivy League” to help with invasive plant removal at adjacent Veterans Memorial Park. - **City of MLT Hiring to Meet Service Demands:** The city is growing and has a number of vacancies to be filled in high-demand service areas. If you or someone you know is interested in working in local government, please check out the following opportunities. In the Finance Department, there are three positions open including Accountant, Finance Technician and Payroll Technician. These roles provide support for important frontline services such as utility billing and payroll, as well as behind-the-scenes assistance including special projects.

The city recently filled a vacancy in the Permitting Division of Community and Economic Development, with another Permit Technician starting in a few weeks. Meanwhile, there is a need for both a Senior Planner and an Associate Planner to keep up with the rapid pace of development and large-scale projects in Mountlake Terrace.

In the Aquatics program, within Recreation and Parks, the city has record registrations for swimming lessons and the need to fill entry-level lifeguard and swim instructor positions. Applicants must be at least 15 years old, and the city will provide and pay for the certification class required by the American Red Cross. Interested parties who are 14 years old may volunteer as an aide in preparation for future employment. The Recreation Department also is seeking to hire two full-time Aquatics Coordinators and part-time Dance and Fitness Instructors for a number of classes offered to our community for children, teens and adults. Finally, the city seeks a Facilities Maintenance Worker to provide building maintenance and repairs at city-owned properties.

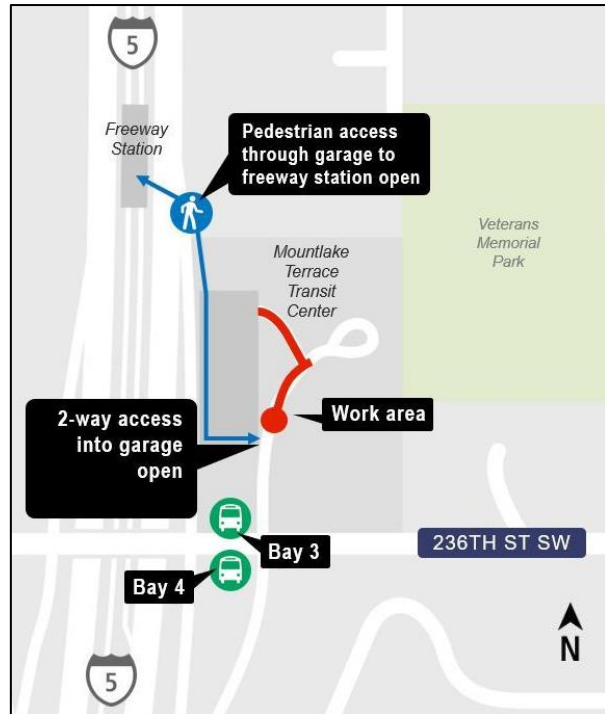
The Aquatics and Recreation staff work at the Recreation Pavilion, located at 5303 228th Street SW, and the Facilities Maintenance Worker reports within the Parks Division. All other positions referenced will work at City Hall, 23204 58th Avenue W.

The City of Mountlake Terrace is preparing to reopen City Hall as construction wraps up on the final punch list items for the Civic Campus. The city also is gearing up for its usual busy summer season in recreation as well as the return of summer events. - **Closure of Mountlake Terrace Parking Garage Lower Entrance:** This past week Sound Transit's contractor closed the lower (main) entrance to the parking garage at the Mountlake Terrace Transit Center to install a retaining wall on the east side of the entrance into the garage.

Vehicles may enter and exit the garage via the upper entrance (see map). The closure will be in effect 24/7 for two weeks. The contractor has obtained a Temporary Noise Variance to complete this work. Protected sidewalk for pedestrian access into the garage will be maintained.

- **Inspection Requests Move Exclusively Online:** Last month, the city began requiring all inspections to be requested via the [Permit Portal](#). The city continues to make an effort to provide consistency and expedite the inspection scheduling process, and consolidating permits and inspections through the portal streamlines this progression.

The former Inspection Hotline will redirect callers to the portal. Additionally, all permit information is housed online, in the same place, and can be accessed by using the permit number. Information regarding the necessity of inspections, and staying in compliance with the accompanying permits, is located on the [Permits & Licenses](#) page.

If you do not have online access, and need to request inspections, please email permitspecialist@mltwa.gov with your permit number, and your request to be added to the account. For additional assistance, please call 425-744-6267.

- **Permits:** Until the city re-opens for in-person services, [permit applications](#) are accepted through a 'no-contact' procedure. Permit processing times have increased due to compliance with COVID mandates. During your work, permits must be on-site, workers must follow COVID-19 protocols, and contractors must have a developed exposure control, mitigation, and recovery plan (Department of Labor & Industries will enforce requirements for contractors to comply). Weekly Patrol Synopsis

- There was one verbal domestic argument this week: 22000 block of 67th Place SW.
- There were five vehicle prowls this week: 24000 block of Van Ry Boulevard, 4500 block of 227th Street SW, 22300 block of 70th Place W, 6700 block of 235th Street SW, and 24100 block of 56th Avenue W.
- There was one vehicle theft this week: 22000 block of 66th Avenue W.
- There were two warrant arrests this week: 6000 block of 244th Street SW and 24000 block of Van Ry Boulevard.
- A catalytic converter was stolen from the 22800 block of Lakeview Drive.
- On March 23, officers were dispatched to Mountlake Terrace High School for a suicidal subject. Upon arrival officers located the subject who agreed to be seen by a mental health professional.

- On March 23, officers were dispatched to the 4800 block of 239th Street SW for a physical domestic. Upon arrival officers located a female who stated that she was assaulted by her husband who had then left the area. Probable cause was developed for the husband but he was not located. He was cited through the prosecutor.
- License plates were stolen from a vehicle in the 4400 block of 212th Street SW.
- There was a hit-and-run in the 21200 block of 52nd Avenue W. No suspects or leads at this time.
- Officers responded to the 5400 block of 212th Street SW for a physical domestic. Probable cause was developed to arrest the male who was booked into jail for Assault 4 (domestic violence).
- On March 25, an attempted theft of a catalytic converter was reported in the 23500 block of Lakeview Drive.
- A catalytic converter was stolen from a vehicle in the 21900 block of 43rd Ct.
- There was a mail theft in the 22900 block of 40th Place W.
- A burglary was reported at Pacific Power Batteries on 220th. There is video of the incident and the case is under investigation.
- There was an attempted burglary in the 4400 block of 231st Place SW and there is video of the attempt. Case is under investigation.
- There was a domestic violence assault in the 23600 block of 54th Avenue W.
- A catalytic converter was stolen from a vehicle in the 6000 block of 244th. No suspects or leads at this time.
- A burglary was reported in the 4400 block of 228th Street SW, with approximately \$19,000 of jewelry stolen. There are no suspects or leads at this time.
- On March 27, there was a domestic assault in the 5700 block of 220th Street SW.
- Officers responded to a victim of a sexual assault that from an incident that had occurred in 2018. Investigation is ongoing.
- A theft was reported in the 23000 block of La Pierre Drive. The suspect was captured on video. Case is under investigation.

Significant Incidents

- Patrol responded to a suicide report at a residence. The caller reported he believed his father had committed suicide. Officers arrived and discovered a male and female in a bedroom, with gunshot wounds and a gun in the deceased male's hand. Officers secured the residence and detectives obtained a search warrant. Further examination concluded a murder/suicide of the elderly couple.
- Officers observed a male with eyes closed slumped over in the driver's seat of a running pick-up truck at the Studio 6 Motel. Due to a number of recent incidents involving the same set of circumstances where DUI drivers have fled recklessly when contacted, officers used the push bars of their patrol vehicles to pin the suspect vehicle in place. While waiting for additional resources, officers noticed weapons in the cab and the license plate on the truck did not match the vehicle (later discovered that both the vehicle and plate were stolen).

Once additional resources were in place, officers attempted contact from a safe distance. The suspect reacted by violently ramming the police cars around his vehicle and other cars on his flanks. Officers were forced to retreat from their cover positions to avoid being injured by the rammed police car.

The use of impact munitions was ordered to stop the driver from trying to injure officers but the munitions could not breach the truck windows. Eventually the driver broke loose and fled towards a dead-end parking lot. The driver chose to turn around and reengage the officers who were standing in the well-lit parking lot with their cars blocking the lane of travel.

The suspect sped towards the officers, smashing his way through five other vehicles as well as two patrol cars that were occupied at the time. One civilian vehicle was flipped over by the impact and another came to rest on top of the first. The suspect vehicle damaged and his flight from law enforcement ended at the parking lot exit where he was taken into custody with minimal force.

The suspect had a large amount of narcotics and cash on his person when he was arrested. The vehicle was impounded. One officer reported a minor injury when his patrol car was rammed. The suspect was booked on multiple charges to include Assault 2, Possession of a Stolen Vehicle, Possession with Intent to Distribute and Hit-and-Run

- Officers were summoned by a Snohomish County Designated Crisis Responder (DCR) to detain a resident pursuant to a court order. Numerous previous attempts over the preceding days had not resulted in voluntary compliance. Officers again tried to establish rapport using open communication, but the subject's mental state prevented that. Eventually a minimal amount of physical force was used to detain and transport the subject to the hospital. No injuries observed, reported or expected.
- On March 27, patrol units were dispatched to a possible deceased male behind a business in the 22800 block of 44th Avenue. Upon arrival, medics were on the scene and confirmed that the 67-year-old male was deceased. The male was found in a makeshift encampment behind a business and a metal shipping container that was used for storage by the owners of the shopping

center. Nothing suspicious was located on the body or in the immediate area. The Medical Examiner responded and removed the deceased.

- Patrol responded to a residence for a report of single shot fired and yelling heard, which was called in by a neighbor. The residence is well known to officers, including having responded there for a shooting last month. Upon arrival, there was no sign of distress or assault outside. Numerous announcements were made in an attempt to get occupants to exit the residence. An entry team was formed and forced entry into the residence. Several other occupants were removed and no injuries were found.

Investigation revealed an altercation occurred outside, and the suspect fired one or two rounds toward the house from a vehicle. A fresh bullet hole was observed in the siding of the structure. Detectives were notified and executed a search warrant to retrieve the surveillance system video, and they attempted to remove the bullet from the house unsuccessfully. A suspect has been identified and investigation is ongoing.

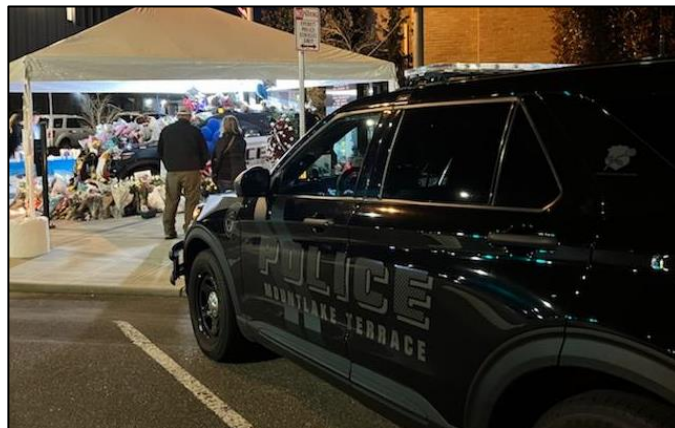
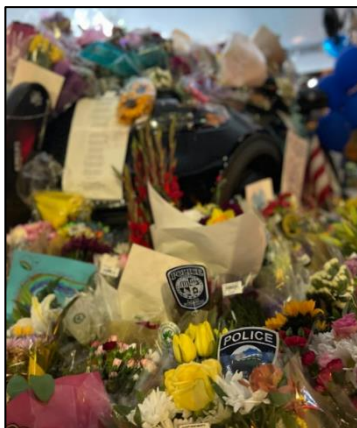
